## Steps for the Word Work Activity "Splitting"

1. Prepare the magnetic letters you will need in advance. This means choosing the word you will teach your child to "split" and the other words with the same word pattern that he/she will be "splitting." This word/word pattern can be something he/she already knows or something you know your child has been exposed to but needs to practice seeing parts in words.
2. For example, if your child needs to learn the -ing ending, prepare the magnetic letters to make the words playing, cooking, walking, and jumping. Another example is if your child needs to learn the word pattern -oy, prepare the magnetic letters to make the words boy, toy, soy, Roy, and coy.
3. Once you have all the magnetic letters prepared, spread them out in a line at the top of a cookie sheet, magnetic board, or even just at the top of the table.
4. Have your child point to each letter going from left to right and say the name of each letter.
5. Quickly and without a lot of talking, pull down the letters to make the first word. For this example, make the word "playing." Underline the word with your finger from left to right and say the word out loud, "playing." Ask your child also to underline the word and say it out loud.
6. Again, quickly and without a lot of talking, show your child how you will "split" the word into two parts. Pull down the first part, "play," in a diagonal going LEFT (for larger parts, use two hands and make sure the part is moved as a whole) and say the part "play." Pull down the "-ing" in a diagonal going LEFT and say the -ing chunk. Underline the whole word from left to right with your finger and say the word "playing." Make it swift and do not explain anything unnecessary. Simply move the parts and say "play" - "-ing" "playing." Show how to split the word several times. You can also split the word going down or up, but always make sure you split from LEFT to RIGHT. (For the -oy example, you would split /b/ -- /oy/ -- "boy," /t/ -- /oy/ -- "toy," etc.)
7. Can your child still split the word into two parts? If needed, model for your child how to split the word "playing" into "play" - "-ing" - "playing." This will take some practice with finger dexterity and pulling the letters together, but try to let your child be independent.
8. Ask your child to copy you and split the word into two parts. Watch your child as he/she does this independently. Does he/she split the word going from left to right with no problem? Does he/she make the corresponding sound with the magnetic letters? Do your child's eyes follow the two parts of the word when splitting it?
9. After your child gets the hang of this, put away the "play" chunk and ask your child to find the letters to make the word "cook." Follow the previous steps to split the word "cooking" into "cook" - "-ing" - "cooking."

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10. Continue splitting the word with new beginnings to the word. Can your child still split the word into two parts? (With the example of boy, toy, Roy, does your child look for a capital $R$ for a person's name?)
11. It is very important to encourage your child to split the word parts only from LEFT to RIGHT to ensure directionality and minimize confusion.
